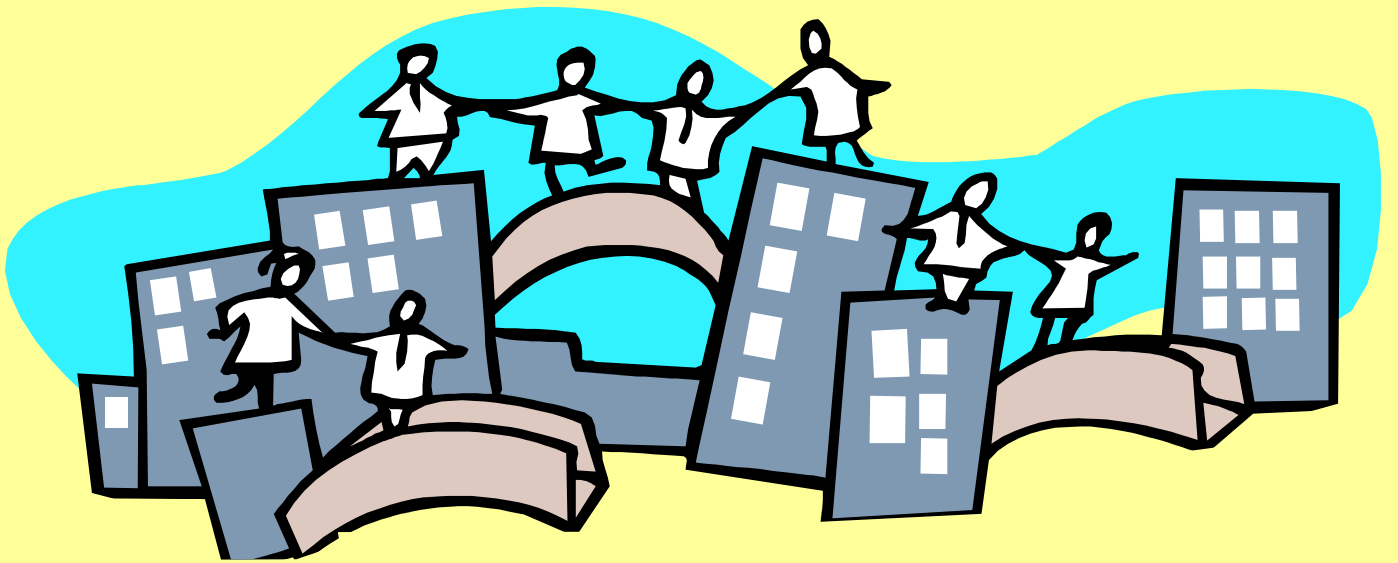

Bridges Out of Poverty Part II: Applying Bridges Concepts

Learn strategies that build relationships and improve outcomes

Workshop Description

This workshop is an extension of the Bridges Out of Poverty (Day One) seminar. The content of the first day is extended into a second day to allow for more discussion and interaction. In this workshop participants will learn more about language experience, cognitive issues, and barriers to change.

Participants will learn how to use mental models to communicate effectively and to assist clients from poverty to learn quickly, explore options, and develop future stories. Participants will also explore the skills of mediation, relationship building, and mentoring.

This workshop introduces strategies for changing program designs, policies, and procedures to improve outcomes. Participants will use case studies and an examination of the client's lifecycle to identify principles of change.

The book *Bridges Out of Poverty* is used as a training manual in the seminars and includes chapters on relationship building, mentoring, redesigning programs, and community collaboration.

Workshop Facilitator



Gary G. Eagleton has worked with economically disadvantaged families/ students since 1976 when the Harris County Comprehensive Employment & Training Administration (CETA) in Texas employed him.

In the mid 1980's, Gary worked with the Harris County Juvenile Probation Department where he first began to build programs for students from diverse economic backgrounds. In the Goose Creek ISD, Gary was involved in implementation of the city's first Gang Activity Prevention Program (GAP) and replication of the Communities In Schools–Baytown Program.

Gary is a ROPES facilitator and serves on several boards: Houston Council on Alcohol & Drugs, Prepared for Life (P4L), Greater Houston Healthy Marriage Coalition, CIS-Houston Program Development Committee, Texas Association of Partners in Education, Houston Healthy Communities, the Healthy Youth Advisory Committee and the City of Refuge Educational Development Corporation (CORE-DC). Gary is also certified to present the Search Institute's 40-Developmental Assets.

First Baptist Church of Alexandria History

In 1803, five men and seven women of the pioneer Baptist Church in Fairfax County, Virginia asked that they be "dismissed agreeably... to be constituted into a regular Baptist Church in the town of Alexandria." Their request was approved. Following the signing of the church's covenant, the twelve, with \$1,988.87 borrowed from a charter member, erected a humble meeting house.

Jeremiah Moore, a prominent traveling preacher, was called as the first pastor. He was instrumental in the adoption of the First Amendment of the Constitution establishing the doctrine of separation of church and state.

In 1853, a new church building was erected on Washington Street. The First Baptist Church continued regular worship services during the Civil War until June 1862 when a military guard seized the church building for use as a hospital. Until the war ended, the baptistry was used as a bathtub for sick and wounded soldiers.

The congregation used the building on Washington Street for 101 years. Following World War II, when the location allowed for no further expansion, a new site was purchased on King Street and the congregation moved to the new facility on May 9, 1954.

First Baptist Church's history is marked by the development of new congregations. The church helped form First Baptist Colored Church of Alexandria, Baptist Temple, Del Ray, Groveton, Glebe, Fair Park, Duke Street, and most recently New Hope Church, which held its first service on Easter Sunday, 1992.

First Baptist continues to be a growing and thriving family of Christians dedicated to the purpose of bringing the gospel of Jesus Christ to the community and the world. The church community includes a diverse membership and encompasses an active deaf congregation. In addition, the church building is used by a Vietnamese congregation and a Hispanic church.

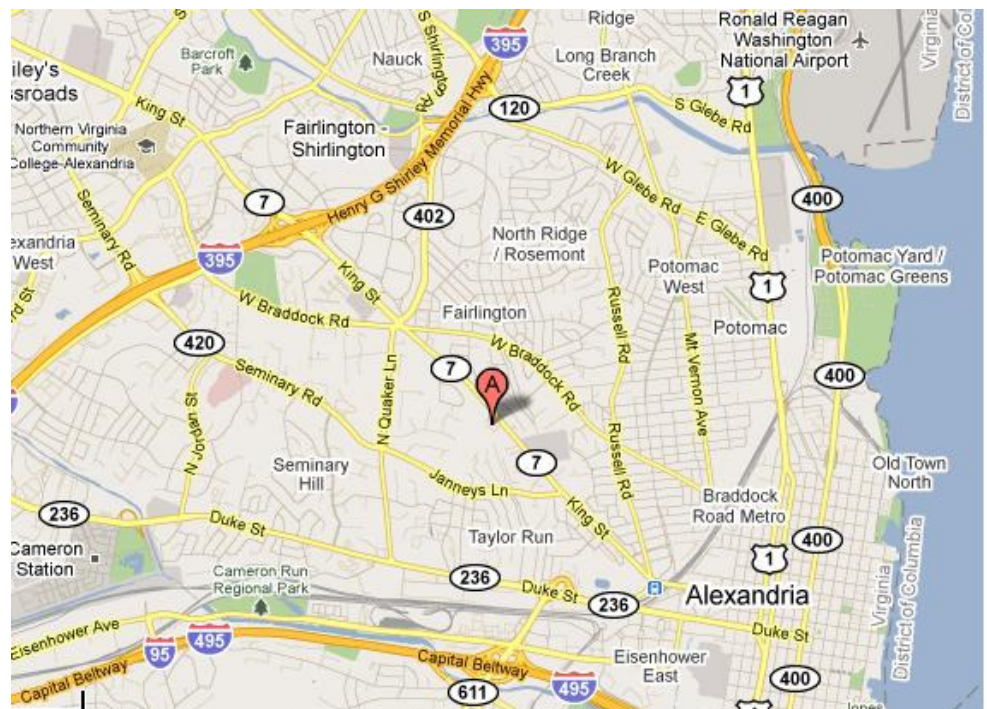
