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CAPITAL AREA FOOD BANK PARTICIPATES IN SUMMER FOOD SERVICE PROGRAM

Funded by US Department of Agriculture

Washington, DC, May 2013 – Following a long tradition, the Capital Area Food Bank's Food for Kids Department today announced that it will once again provide a feeding program to children throughout the Washington metro area. The Summer Food Service Program, for which the food bank will be an acting program sponsor, is funded by the US Department of Agriculture.

Kendra Rowe Salas, Director of Food for Kids, explained that the summer is a critical time for low-income school-age children. "This summer, we will expand our services to partner with approximately 80 sites and serve 2,000 children. We tailor our services to our sites' unique needs. That way, we can provide the best fit for each site and for the community," she said.

According to the most recent hunger statistics provided by the 2010 U.S. Census, 14.3 % of the 983,930 children who reside in the Capital Area Food Bank's service area of Washington, DC; Northern Virginia; and Montgomery and Prince George's counties in Maryland are at risk of hunger. In DC alone, 30.7 percent of the children are food insecure.

During the school year, Food for Kids operates afterschool and weekend meals programs called Kids Cafe® and Weekend Bag. Both of these programs fill meal gaps, supplementing school-based federal free or reduced price breakfasts and lunches. Kids Cafe provides afterschool snacks and dinners to children at risk of hunger Monday through Friday. Meal service is extended in the summertime with many sites offering daily breakfasts, lunches, snacks and suppers. Weekend Bag provides bags of pantry staples and fresh produce for children and their families over the weekend when school is out of session.

The Capital Area Food Bank, a member of Feeding America, was founded on January 15, Martin Luther King's birthday in1980, and takes a comprehensive approach to addressing hunger by increasing access to nutritious food, initiating certain lifestyle change through skill-building and advocacy and creating sustainability with outreach and training for those at risk of hunger.
