

Does anyone in your household currently receive benefits through the following government programs?

We are asking about other government programs to help us understand who may be eligible for certain programs and to help provide access to those resources if possible.

Benefit	Description
<i>TANF or cash assistance</i>	The Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program provides monthly cash assistance payments to families with children living on lower income.
<i>Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)</i>	The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) provides nutritious foods and nutrition education for pregnant, postpartum, and breastfeeding women, and infants and children up to age 5 who are living on a lower income.
<i>Social Security</i>	Social Security provides monthly income supplements to people who have retired, people who are living with a disability, survivors of workers who have died, and dependents of beneficiaries.
<i>Supplemental Security Income (SSI)</i>	Supplemental Security Insurance (SSI) provides monthly income for people living on low income who are 65 or older, blind, or disabled.
<i>Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) or disability payments</i>	Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI or SSD) is a government insurance program that provides monthly income to workers who are living with a disability and their families.
<i>Medicare</i>	Medicare is the government health insurance program for people who are 65 or older, certain younger people living with disabilities, and people with End-Stage Renal Disease (permanent kidney failure requiring dialysis or a transplant, sometimes called ESRD).
<i>Medicaid</i>	Medicaid is the nation's public health insurance program for people living on a lower income.
<i>Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)</i>	The Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) is a government insurance program that provides low-cost health coverage to children in families that earn too much money to qualify for Medicaid but not enough to buy private insurance. In some states, CHIP covers pregnant women.
<i>Free/reduced price school meals</i>	The National School Lunch Program (NSLP) and National School Breakfast Program (SBP) provide low- or no-cost nutritionally balanced meals to qualified children each school day.
<i>Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) or other refundable tax credits</i>	Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) is a tax credit that households living on a lower income receive when they file their federal tax return.
<i>Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)</i>	The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) assists households living on a lower income with their heating and cooling energy bills.
<i>Unemployment</i>	Unemployment insurance (UI), also called unemployment benefits, is a type of state-provided insurance that pays money to individuals on a weekly basis when they lose their job through no fault of their own.
<i>Worker's Compensation</i>	Workers' compensation insurance provides medical and income benefits to people who are injured or living with an illness due to work.
<i>Housing subsidies</i>	Housing subsidies, also known as housing choice vouchers, assist families living on very low income, seniors, and people living with a disability to afford decent, safe, and sanitary housing.
<i>Veteran's Assistance</i>	Veteran's Assistance benefits help Veterans and their families buy homes, earn degrees, start careers, stay healthy, and more.
<i>Commodity Supplemental Food Program</i>	The Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) works to improve the health of low-income persons at least 60 years of age by supplementing their diets with nutritious USDA Foods.
